ASTHMA POLICY

The Preschool aims to include children with asthma in all areas of the group's activities but always have a regard to guidelines produced by the National Asthma Campaign UK.

If a child with asthma becomes breathless and wheezy or coughs continually the following action is recommended:

- Remain calm.
- Let child sit down in the position they find most comfortable. Do not make them lie down.
- Let the child take their usual treatment. If the child has forgotten their inhaler and you do not have prior permission to use another inhaler:
 1. Call parents.
 2. Failing that, call family doctor.
 3. Check the attack is not severe (see below).
- Wait 5 to 10 minutes.
- If the symptoms disappear, the child can go back to their previous activity.
- If the symptoms have improved but not completely disappeared, call the parents and give another dose of the inhaler while waiting for them.
- If normal medication has had no effect, see severe asthma attack below.

Severe Asthma Attack

Any of the following signs mean a severe attack:

- Normal relief medication does not work at all.
- The child is breathless enough to have difficulty in talking normally.
- The pulse rate is 120 per minute or more.
- Rapid breathing of 130 breaths per minute or more.
- **Call ambulance** (they will have oxygen on board).
- Get someone to inform parents.



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- If child has an emergency supply of oral steroids give them the stated dose **NOW**.
- Keep trying with the usual inhaler every 5 to 10 minutes and don't worry about possible overdosing

Registration

- When parents complete the registration form for their child they must be asked whether he/she has asthma and to keep the Preschool informed should these conditions arise in future.
- Details of treatment must be stated together with clear guidance on usage.

Inhalers


- Any inhalers brought into Preschool must be kept in the First Aid cupboard but not locked away as easy access is essential.
- Inhalers must be taken on outings.
- All inhalers should be clearly identified with the name of the child.

Sports

- All children with asthma will be closely observed for signs of wheezing, coughing or other signs of asthma. If specified by the parent, a dose of the inhaler should be given before commencing sports activities.

Reviewing the Policy

The Asthma Policy will be kept under review and will be reviewed annually
